Methamphetamine residue in wastewater shows 5-fold increase in consumption

Over 1000 samples were taken in one regional and one metropolitan area between 2009 and 2015, revealing a 4.8 times increase in the metropolitan area, and a 3.4 times increase in the regional area. The report follows a recent University of Queensland study that recorded 270,000 regular methamphetamine users in Australia, an increase of over 50,000 since 2014.

Indonesia

President will raise status of narcotics agency head to ministerial level

The president estimated that half of all drugs in Indonesia are circulated within correctional institutions.

Japan

National Police Agency reports 40% rise in young cannabis law offenders

The NPA said the figures reflect a trend among young people turning away from New Psychoactive Substances (NPS) in favour of cannabis, following wider recognition of their danger and the imposition of tighter controls. More than 70% of those recorded were first time offenders.

Japan-UNODC sign project on border security in Pakistan

Japan has offered \$6.5 million in assistance to the UNODC in Pakistan, with the hope of curbing drug trafficking in the region. The UNODC Pakistan will implement the project, with funding being allocated to the controversial Anti Narcotics Force (ANF), among other law enforcement agencies, as well as a 'triangular initiative' intended to facilitate greater cooperation between Pakistan, Afghanistan and Iran.
